A PERSPECTIVE ON the Importance of Developmental Screening

We have all heard the statement “the earlier we start, the farther we go”. This is definitely true for children. According to the CDC, if a child has a developmental delay, it is important to get help as soon as possible. When a developmental delay is not found early, it could result in children having to wait to get the help they need when they enter Kindergarten. This may cause challenges for the child when starting school. The stimulation and early experiences a child is exposed to has a direct impact on their development. However, some children experience gaps or delays in their development. It is important to identify developmental delays early so that the child has the best opportunity to minimize the effects of the delay. Parents who have concerns about their child’s development may consult with the child’s primary care doctor who, in turn, can assist the family in making a referral. A child under the age of three can be referred to the appropriate Child and Family Connections office. A child three and older should be referred to their local school district for screening and possible evaluation. This will determine whether the child will qualify and benefit from early childhood opportunities. As stated in the Zero to Three Journal, “The early years of a child’s life are very important for his or her health and development. Healthy development means that children of all abilities, including those with special health care needs, are able to grow up where their social, emotional and educational needs are met.”

- support around using the Ages and Stages Questionnaires, Third Edition (ASQ-3) and Ages and Stages Questionnaires: Social-Emotional (ASQ:SE) Online.

- support around establishing effective and efficient referral and follow-up procedures for children in need of referrals, so that these practices can continue to provide a high-quality medical home for patients.

ASQ-3 and ASQ: SE are research-based, standardized, valid and reliable developmental screening tools. They are designed to identify those things that children CAN do, but also can identify areas of development where children may benefit from further assessment and possibly additional support. They DO NOT provide diagnoses.

ASQ-3 focuses on each child's global development (communication, gross motor, fine motor, problem solving and personal-social skills).

ASQ: SE examines the social and emotional competence of children. This instrument looks at the areas of self-regulation, compliance, communication, adaptive behaviors, autonomy, affect, and interaction with people.
